#### Thought for the month

#### Thankfulness

We are entering a season of thankfulness. In October we will celebrate Harvest festivals in our churches and schools, and in November America will celebrate Thanksgiving. Yet this year has been a hard year: for us as a family with lots of goodbyes to people and places; for our country with rising costs of fuel and food; and for the world with extreme temperatures causing more fires and floods than usual. I found it hard to contemplate being thankful.

Then I remembered my friend Yvette who had sickle cell anaemia, a life-limiting and extremely painful condition. Her pain was so severe that she was fitted with a permanent syringe driver delivering morphine but she was the most positive, thankful person I have known. Despite her condition she was always laughing. As I thought about Harvest, I remembered one sunny afternoon in my garden when she teasingly blagged an apple from one of my neighbour's trees. She was so excited by this one perfect fruit, its shape, colour and, above all, its taste.

Thanksgiving had been around for many years in America before Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national day of thanksgiving and praise to God for the success of the harvest, but at the same time he referred to difficult times and humanity's role in causing them. So he called on Americans at Thanksgiving to implore God to 'heal the wounds of our nation.'

One of the readings for our Harvest Festivals is from Deuteronomy where, after 40 years of wandering in the desert, the Israelites have entered Israel and are commanded, 'when you have eaten and are satisfied praise the Lord your God' (Deuteronomy 8:10). But this command is followed by another, warning them not to become proud and complacent.

So it seems that over the centuries harvest, thankfulness and difficult times have always been intertwined. And perhaps, like my friend Yvette, it is possible to laugh for joy and be thankful in the midst of the pain and messiness of our lives.

#### It happened in October...

150 years ago: on 1<sup>st</sup> October 1873, Edwin Landseer, artist and sculptor, died. Known for his animal paintings, he also created the lion sculptures at the base of Nelson's Column.

100 years ago: on 10<sup>th</sup> October 1923, Nicholas Parsons, host of *Just a Minute* and *Sale of the Centuury*, was born.

90 years ago: on 17<sup>th</sup> October 1933, Albert Einstein arrived in the USA as a refugee from Nazi Germany.

75 years ago: on 27<sup>th</sup> October 1948, the Morris Minor car was launched at the British Motor Show at Earl's Court in London. It cost £358.

65 years ago: on 1<sup>st</sup> October 1958, Paddington Bear made his debut when **Michael Bond's book** *A Bear Called Paddington* was published.

Also 65 years ago: on 28<sup>th</sup> October 1958, the State Opening of Parliament was televised for the first time.

60 years ago: on 15<sup>th</sup> October 1963, the term 'Beatlemania' first appeared in print (in the *Daily Mirror*).

40 years ago: on 5<sup>th</sup> October 1983, Lech Walesa, leader of Poland's Solidarity movement (and later President of Poland) was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize.

Also 40 years ago, on 25<sup>th</sup> October 1983, Microsoft Word 1.0 was released.

30 years ago: on 15<sup>th</sup> October 1993, South African leaders Nelson Mandela and F.W. de Klerk won the Nobel Peace Prize for their efforts to end apartheid.

25 years ago: on 16<sup>th</sup> October 1998, David Trimble and John Hume won the Nobel Peace Prize for brokering the Northern Ireland peace accord.

#### Bible Sunday: 29th October

At his Coronation, the King was given a Bible with the words 'the most valuable thing that this world affords.' As Bible Sunday is celebrated this month, let's ask why we should read the Bible?

The Bible isn't a single book, but a library of 66 books, composed by some 44 writers over 1,500 years in a range of styles including history, poetry, prophecy, letters and apocalyptic (looking at the end times). Despite the number of different writers, it claims one authority: God Himself! 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (2 Timothy 3:16). The Bible is inspired ('the word of God in the words of men') and equips us to live for God in every aspect of our lives. We also have the promise of the Holy Spirit to guide us when we read, 'when the Spirit of truth comes, He will guide you into all truth' (John 16:13).

How should we read the Bible? Let's consider the following guidelines:

*Right time:* we need a regular routine which will meet our needs. This will vary according to our circumstances, eg somebody with a demanding job, a mum at home with young children, or a retired person.

*Right place*: we need to find a space where we can be undisturbed (eg lounge, bedroom, train or kitchen).

Right version: we need a version of the Bible which we can readily understand and use. A number of versions are available (eg NIV, The Message), as well as Bible apps we can access on our phone.

Right help: reading notes help us to understand a passage and apply it to our lives.

Let's get reading!!

#### Those over-the-top words we use...

I'm trying to stop saying the word 'incredible'. It's overused and has become almost meaningless. 'We are incredibly grateful.' 'I had an incredible meal.' As the word really means 'beyond belief or understanding', it can't actually apply in either case. 'Unbelievable' is similarly misused. So is 'fantastic', which is meant to describe something belonging to an imaginary world. Strictly speaking, a fantastic tennis player can't be a real one.

How about 'amazing'? Count how many times you hear it today. It should be reserved to describe something astonishing, out of this world. If you think about it, if everything is amazing or incredible, then nothing really is. When the exceptional becomes normal or commonplace, nothing is special.

We seem to struggle to find words to convey something out of the ordinary. Try 'iconic'. Iconic only appeared recently and has been distorted to mean 'historic', 'traditional' or 'classic'. My dictionary tells me iconic actually means something to do with an icon, which is a depiction of Christ, the Virgin Mary, or a saint.

In fact, most of these over-the-top words, now in everyday use, have a religious association. Originally they were reserved to communicate otherness, difference, deep respect. For example, what about 'awesome'? It should mean 'awe' or reverence. It's a take-your-breath-away word. Awe is what Moses felt when he saw a bush on fire, because it didn't actually burn away, and he sensed the presence of God. Awe is something St Peter experienced, when he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!'

If you try to imagine what Moses and Peter actually felt, words like 'unworthiness' and 'fear' might come to mind. They really were experiencing something out of the ordinary, too hot to handle. They were out of their depth. An experience like that stayed with them for life; they had encountered holiness. Now there's a word worth using.

#### The Beatitudes: Blessed are the meek

Jesus calls those who live for His kingdom to demonstrate His character: 'Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth' (Matthew 5:5). Meekness can come over as being 'weak or feeble', hence 'Gentle Jesus, meek and mild.' However, the Greek word means being tamed, 'Blessed are those who are tamed, under control.' The picture is that of a horse brought under control; strength under submission. Meekness begins with an honest view of ourselves, where we don't have to worry about what others think of us but trust in what God is able to do in us.

Moses is described as 'very meek, more than all men that were on the face of the earth' (Numbers 12:3). Moses was certainly not a weak leader, but he submitted to God's plans for his life. Meekness accepts what comes, even if it hurts, knowing that it's for our good.

A meek person will tame themselves to listen to the promptings of the Holy Spirit, who shows us how to respond in any situation practically and prayerfully. It means being careful about how we respond to those who provoke us; not being angry or striking out. When we encounter difficult situations or people who wind us up, how are we prepared to pray before speaking? We should not be out of control, but under God's control!

Let's not forget the promise of this beatitude, that the meek person will 'inherit the earth.' Those who are prepared to forgo their rights in this world will be made infinitely rich in the future.

#### On the perils of Harvest...

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

In the unlikely event of ever being put in charge of designing the course for those being trained for ordination, I would make a few significant changes. Modules on doctrine, Church history and Greek would be dropped as unnecessary. In their place, I would add courses on how to run a tight jumble sale, ways to keep your church council in order and how to negotiate Harvest.

The first skirmish starts in early summer when it becomes clear that the flower arrangers' plans mean that the choir would disappear behind a huge array of chrysanthemums. The choir retaliate by announcing that their Harvest anthem must take place just when the Sunday School intended to re-enact the parable of the Good Samaritan. They, in turn, raise the stakes by insisting that a stage will be needed for their performance, thus ensuring that I will be separated from the congregation by an impenetrable barricade.

This inevitably results in the annual act of the verger handing in his resignation, the bell ringers threatening a mass walk-out, and those who organise coffee afterwards demanding that my sermon lasts no more than three minutes to ensure there will be plenty of time for socialising after the Service.

I greet all suggestions with a spontaneous burst of indifference, smile, agree with it all – and do nothing (a good policy for all decision-making). Inevitably, everything goes ahead exactly as it has always done for the last century. Come the day, there will be the usual pyramid of apples temptingly near the choirboys, so designed that when someone tries to pinch an apple during the sermon, the whole pile disintegrates as they roll all over the chancel. On the following Friday, all will leave after the Harvest Supper saying that the entertainment was worse than last year and the absence of red cabbage had quite ruined the hot pot. Everyone therefore has had an enjoyable evening.

My Harvest training course would be compulsory and a pass mark of 90% would be needed before ordination could be considered.



Ofsted recognised that pupils benefit from exceptional educational experiences ensuring high standards in the quality of education provided. They went on to say that 'leaders are determined all pupils reach their full potential' and 'they have designed a curriculum that ensures this vision is realised.' The report also recognised that leaders provide 'inspirational leadership.'


