The Beatitudes: Blessed are the poor in spirit

Jesus begins the Sermon on the Mount with the Beatitudes (*Matthew 5:1-12*), declaring the blessings of God's kingdom. The word *blessed* describes how we can live under God's blessing. Jesus talks about the 'beautiful attitudes' (Billy Graham) that characterise followers of Jesus. They speak more about who we are than what we do and reflect perfectly the character of Jesus that He wants to develop in us.

'Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven' is the first beatitude (Matthew 5:3). To be 'poor in spirit' is not simply being poor economically, as the word used means 'being dependent on others for support'. It is the opposite of spiritual pride, recognising that we all fall short of God's standards in our thoughts, words and actions.

It's not just about what we do for God, but what He has done for us through Jesus' death on the cross. As we bring our sin, guilt, shame and failure to Him, in grace He offers us His love, acceptance and forgiveness. We come with empty hands, 'Nothing in my hands I bring, simply to thy cross I cling' (Augustus Toplady).

This is well illustrated by the tax collector in Jesus' parable. 'God have mercy on me, a sinner' (Luke 18:13). It is cry that says 'O God, I am in a mess. I've got nothing to offer. I haven't begun to pray or hear you properly. I am spiritually poor.' To those who cry out like this, Jesus says 'theirs is the kingdom of heaven' (Matthew 5:3). The kingdom of God flings opens its doors to beggars!

'There is nothing we can do to make God love us more; there is nothing we can do to make God love us less' (Philip Yancey: What's So Amazing About Grace).

Be still and know...

'Be still and know that I am God' (Psalm 46:10). Have you ever thought of taking some time out of daily life to simply 'be still' with God? When one lady heard that her friend was 'taking some time out to "be still" and listen to God', she responded with curiosity, 'What does His voice sound like?'

It gives me a sense of peace which is deeper than any pain and stronger than any fear. No wonder the Scriptures talk of a peace that passes all understanding!'

God speaks to us individually, through His Word, the Bible. And sometimes, when we are outside, He can also speak to us through His beautiful world. The blue sky says 'always look up'; the sun says 'shine'; the birds say 'sing'; the trees say 'be fruitful' and the flowers say 'consider the lilies'. The open road ahead says 'go into the world and preach the Gospel'. The gentle rustle of the wind in the trees says 'though you can't see My face, you can hear Me, see reflections of Me, feel Me, touch Me and know Me through all I create, if you just take the time to be still!'

ASAP

Have you ever considered the abbreviation ASAP? Generally, it brings even more hurry and stress into our lives. Yet there is another way to think of ASAP, a way which might help us deal with those difficult times.

When there's work to do and deadlines to meet and your colleagues are rushing around, here's what you can do to help: ASAP – Always Say a Prayer. When your worries mount up and you don't know how you are ever going to cope with what is coming at you: ASAP – Always Say a Prayer.

God knows how stressful our lives can be, and wants to ease our cares. In the Bible He promises to respond to our calls for help. So call Him! *ASAP!*

God can use everything we give Him

The story is told of a man in charge of building a great church, who was pestered by an apprentice who wanted to design the glass for one of the windows. Finally, he agreed that the apprentice should be given one very small window BUT the apprentice would have to provide all the materials himself.

Undaunted, the apprentice carefully swept up all the stray bits of coloured glass that had been discarded and set to work. Slowly, and with great care, he pieced together a window of rare beauty. When the church was finally opened, many people stopped to stare in wonder at his small, but so beautiful, iridescent window.

Our lives can be like that – no matter how small we may feel, or that we have only scraps to offer to God, He can still help us use every bit of time and energy and love we do have to build a life that is beautiful and which will reflect the glory of God to others.

Do you need a new painkiller?

Do you ever take pain killers? If so, do you take one for your shoulder and another one for your knee? Of course not! Once the painkiller enters your bloodstream, it goes everywhere, soothing and damping down the pain and hitting all the right spots.

God works a bit like that on the pain in our lives. He has a prescription for ALL the problem areas of our lives. Most of us carry around with us emotional scars or a burden or some heartache. It may be the trauma of loss, anxiety for our family, uncertainty over our jobs and our futures. Whatever it is, God offers us a prescription to help the pain. The psalmist wrote, 'God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble' (Psalm 46:1). Jesus added, 'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest' (Matthew 11:28).

This kind of help is real and immediate and is there for the asking. We don't have to put up with our dis-ease and struggle alone. God is only a prayer away. Not just twice a day, after meals, but whenever we need Him.

On why it is so hard to read...

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

Your suggestion that every month at clergy meetings, someone should review a book of theology they have been reading was bound to be greeted with uneasy resistance. It would mean the majority would have to start *opening* books, rather than just occasionally dusting them. Possessing books does not necessarily imply that they are ever read. Clerical studies may be lined with books, but they are largely for effect – and to hide damp patches on the wallpaper. Anything with hard covers will have been bought with the best of intentions – but somehow the vicarage lawn or the church hall drains will have taken precedence. And from what I know of your colleague over at St Crispin's, the only books he will buy will be to colour in.

I do try to keep up with my reading, but sleep mercifully intervenes after the first 10 minutes. On days when I sit by my study window, so passers-by can see me deeply occupied in intellectual activity, it is most useful that my large tome on the letters of Eusebius can easily conceal an Agatha Christie inside it.

I confess that I was once gloriously put down when I tried to impress one of our blue stockings by mentioning a new edition of a Dostoevsky novel. She replied, 'I have never read Dostoevsky in translation.' It only confirmed my suspicions that she had worked as a Russian spy in earlier years.

I was hugely impressed when, during the bitter cold of last winter, the Earl of Stowe, whose library would comfortably contain one of our cathedrals, told me he was slowly getting through its contents of tens of thousands of volumes. It was only some time later that I discovered he meant he threw the occasional one on the fire when he was running low on wood.

No, my dear Darren, the only literary activities that will spark interest will be crosswords for the majority or diocesan reports for the truly dedicated – with weighty tomes being used as door stops.


