Job: what's the big idea?

Continuing the series introducing the books of the Bible...

'Why does God allow suffering?' This is a frequently asked question of Christians, because we believe in a God who is both good and powerful, and it is explored in the book of Job. This book is part of the wisdom literature, along with Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon.

Job was both wealthy and righteous, yet he experienced catastrophic suffering, losing all his wealth, children and health. This is portrayed as a result of Satan's challenge to God, testing whether Job's devotion to God was dependent on his circumstances or not. The main body of the book (*Job 3:1-42:6*) consists of dialogues between Job, his friends (Eliphaz, Bildad, and Zophar) and God. Job and his friends assume that God is almighty and just, and that no human being is wholly innocent. In the three cycles of speeches they wrestle with the reasons for Job's suffering, remembering his morally upright character.

Finally, all are silenced by God as He speaks (*chapters 38-42*). He points out that Job knows very little about the universe when he reflects on God's power. Job confesses his lack of understanding and weakness, but goes on to confess his trust in God. This puts suffering in a right perspective. Job is not condemned, and the book ends with the restoration of his family and possessions.

The importance of this book is that it realistically addresses the painful questions of life, without offering simplistic answers. It focuses on *how* we should respond to suffering, rather than on *why* **God allows suffering**. *'Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked I shall depart. The LORD gave and the LORD has taken away; may the name of the LORD be praised'* (Job 1:21).

Some perks of getting old

Things you buy now won't wear out.

Your eyes won't get much worse.

Your secrets are safe with your friends because they can't remember them either.

Must a church keep moving or can we rest?

There is a healthy tension at the heart of the Christian journey. It's the push and pull of staying or of getting up and going. And the Bible speaks of both as part of the normal Christian life.

In his letter to the Corinthians, Paul seems to be spurring his readers on to do even more, 'Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters... always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labour in the Lord is not in vain' (1 Corinthians 15:58).

But then, in John's Gospel, we hear Jesus warning us, 'I am the vine; you are the branches... apart from me you can do nothing' (John 15:5). Who wants to find they have moved on and achieved nothing?

In the process of transformation (becoming like Jesus) there seems to be this healthy tension between 'doing' and 'abiding'.

Some churches try to solve the tension by ticking the 'abiding' option. No one is challenged, the training of a new generation of leaders is half-hearted and resources are safely banked. We create a pathway that leads nowhere much, and then happily walk up and down it each week. We just 'are' Christians.

Other churches rush helter-skelter in the opposite direction. Exhaustion and burnout are their trademarks. They pile up meetings and programmes and use people until they are burnt out. There is no depth, no profound mystery and nowhere to rest and refresh the exhausted traveller.

If the journey into Christ-likeness needs us to rest as well as to get going, then as churches we need to plan for both. We need to be prepared to roll up our sleeves, sacrifice comfort and pour ourselves out in God's service. But we also need to take time to seek intimacy with Him, and to be transformed by His Spirit within us. We need to become an oasis of grace and love to the people we encounter.

Now that sounds like a balance well kept, when both 'going' and yet 'staying' are still options.

Barnabas: a very likeable disciple

This month we remember St Barnabas, whose real name was Joseph, a wealthy Levite from Cyprus. However, he was better known by his nickname which means *Son of Encouragement (Acts 4:36)*. Throughout Acts we see him encouraging others in different ways.

Barnabas was an example of generous giving (*Acts 4:36-7*) when he sold property and offered the money to the church for those in need. In the midst of a caring and sharing community, he was singled out as a symbol of generosity. Are we known as somebody who is generous to those in need around us?

Barnabas later encouraged a new Christian in the person of Paul (*Acts 9:27*). After Paul's conversion, and knowing his reputation, Barnabas came alongside him and brought him into the fellowship of the church. Are we ready to help those who are new in the faith to find a place in our church?

Finally, Barnabas was sent to the church in Antioch where he 'saw the evidence of the grace of God' (Acts 11:23). It was a church which brought Jewish and Gentile believers together for the first time. Like Barnabas, do we rejoice when we see God doing new things in people's lives? Are we also willing to embrace these things and facilitate change?

Encouragement is one of the spiritual gifts in the New Testament (*Romans 12:8*). It can be greatly undervalued, but it is crucial in growing the church. Like Barnabas, will we nurture gifting; strengthen the doubters and those tempted to give up; show generosity to God's people and beyond the church; alongside strengthening people to move beyond their own comfort zones to help those in need?

Let's be prepared to ask the following questions, 'Are there people alongside us who will encourage us? and 'How can we be encouragers to others?'

My mind is like an internet browser these days: at least 19 tabs are open, three of them are frozen and I have no clue where the music is coming from.

On why people should ALWAYS sit in the same pew...

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James-the-Least, whose elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to his nephew Darren, a recently-ordained low-church curate... My dear Nephew Darren,

I have to say that the couple who complained that you never noticed they had been missing from church had a point. There is a simple way of noticing when someone is absent: everyone sits in the same pew. Every Sunday. Always.

Little Miss Margison sits in the pew after the third pillar on the right here at St James-the-Least. As she walks up the aisle, you can sense her counting the pillars until she reaches the right one. If I ever have that pillar removed, then the following Sunday, she probably would have a complete mental collapse.

One Sunday a visiting family arrived early and sat down; three people in an empty church seating 200. Colonel Wainwright and his wife were the first of our regulars to arrive and froze in horror. The Colonel said in a deafening whisper to his wife, 'There's someone sitting in our pew.' At least they had the grace – no matter how reluctant – for one week, to sit somewhere else. Unlike the Prentice family of husband, wife and three children, who arrived to discover that a visiting family of husband, wife and four children were sitting in their pew; six people in a pew that held eight. Or, it normally holds eight. That Sunday, it held thirteen.

We have one iconoclast who makes a point of sitting in a different place every week. This thoroughly unsettles the rest of the congregation, who fear she may sit in their seats during her nomadic wanderings.

Occasionally the unexpected can happen. Mrs Cholmondeley arrived one week in good time, settled herself in her accustomed place, but half-way through the Service suddenly ran out of the building. Ten minutes later, she was back and in her usual place once again. When the church filled with the smell of burned bacon, we understood.

That is why replacing pews with chairs in your church was a mistake. Pews can never be moved. You know where everybody is – or should be!

And remind us of the good times that we all had together.



Harvington First School News

Last half term our Year 2 pupils were learning about how to stay healthy. As part of the topic, they had a visitor who gave them some first aid training. The children had the chance to pretend to be a doctor or a nurse with a teddy bear as a patient, and learnt how to use plasters and cold compresses, how to put someone into the recovery position and how to phone for an ambulance. They had a lot of fun with bandages, slings, thermometers, stethoscopes and masks!

Nursery and Reception went on a joint trip to *All Things Wild* in Honeybourne. Each class had a workshop where they met some animals including a corn snake and an armadillo! The children loved seeing all the animals and dinosaurs and even had a ride on the dino-train!

During the Spring term, the whole school spent time learning about the Easter story. Year 5 did a fantastic job of organising our Easter service with each class presenting something they had been working on, including prayers, songs, poems, pictures and prayer stones.

This half term, our Christian value will be *Perseverance*. The children will be encouraged to have self-belief in order to keep on going, even when the going gets tough, and to speak out for what they believe is right. We will be testing our perseverance skills later this month as we carry out our sponsored walk. We have several different routes around the village so you might see us out and about! The children will be raising sponsorship for our PTFA funds and for our school charity. This year we are supporting Cancer Research UK in memory of Mrs Fishbourne.
