— *Thought for the month*

As you may know, I was away for much of the early summer – walking 700 miles from one end of England to the other, raising around £25,000 for the disaster-relief charity ShelterBox.

That meant walking 12–15 miles nearly every day for eight weeks, from Land's End in Cornwall to the Scottish border on the Northumberland coast.

Three weeks in, on the last Saturday in May, we reached Worcester, having survived the first summer heatwave. I looked back in amazement: I had walked there from Land's End, almost 300 miles away. But then it sank in: still five weeks and over 400 challenging miles ahead, before I'd reached my goal.

I walked with St Paul's words in mind: 'Forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal'. Not immediately for 'the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus', as for St Paul – though that's always the big picture – but rather to reach the most northerly point in England, and complete my walk.

I realised that I had a chance of making it by actually not thinking too much about 'what lies ahead', but by concentrating on the path beneath my feet: one foot in front of the other. Just enough to get me through for that day's walk. Then the same tomorrow.

September is a month when we leave summer behind – with mixed feelings, no doubt! – and 'what lies ahead' starts to loom: back to work, a new school year, the autumn routine. Just walk it a day at a time – and try to keep blister-free!

A New Festival for the Church's Year

At the General Synod, (the Church of England's Parliament) meeting in York in July, final approval was given to a new addition to the Church of England's calendar: the **Festival of Creation in Christ**. The Church will keep it each year **on the first Sunday in September**, opening the wider Season of Creation that runs through to St Francis's day on 4th October.

The festival draws on an established idea. Since 1989, when the Ecumenical Patriarch Demetrios I (Archbishop of Constantinople in the Eastern Orthodox Church) proposed a day of prayer for the natural world, Christians across many traditions have marked 1 September as a time to thank God for creation and to pray for its protection.

The name chosen by Synod adds something to that inheritance. Calling it the Festival of Creation in Christ places creation within the story of Christ himself, in the same way that Christmas or Easter each hold up one facet of who he is. Scripture describes Christ as the one through whom all things came into being, so the festival treats creation not as a separate subject alongside our faith but as one more place to encounter Him. The naming also carries forward the Church's teaching that God's work in Christ reaches beyond human salvation to the renewal of the whole created order, a theme set out at length in a companion document, *Hope for All Creation* – available free online.

This new teaching document from the House of Bishops gives the fuller theological grounding for the festival. It traces how the Bible speaks of creation as sustained moment by God, disrupted by human sin, and reconciled through Christ's cross and resurrection, with the whole created order awaiting the same renewal that Christians already glimpse in him. Read alongside the new festival, the document asks every parish to treat care for the earth as part of ordinary Christian discipleship, rooted in this hope for creation's redemption rather than a general concern for the environment borrowed from elsewhere.

For us in this Benefice, this gives our own harvest season a clear theological anchor in creation. A moment to mark the festival, or readings woven into worship on that Sunday, giving us a chance to join a celebration now shared across the whole Church of England and, indeed, much of the worldwide Church. Further details of how each of our parishes will mark creation and harvest this year are found further within.

The Heart of England Forest

From tees to trees: Harvington Wood.

The former 47-hectare golf course at Manor Farm, Anchor Lane, was purchased by the Heart of England Forest late in 2025 and is being transformed into a rich landscape of woodland, wetlands, and wildflower meadows as part of the growing Heart of England Forest. The restoration, which began in August, will see the creation of a mosaic of woodland, wetland, and grassland habitats, which will also offer new footpath routes for you to explore. Completion is set for April 2027.

The charity's vision is to grow the Forest to 12,000 hectares by planting 12 million trees on land that will be protected for generations. As it grows, the Forest will provide a richer home for wildlife and a special place for people to explore, relax, and reconnect with nature. Together, we're helping to build a stronger, more resilient landscape, where both people and wildlife can flourish.

The creation of Harvington Wood is part of a wider collaboration with the Environment Agency which is enabling us to deliver ambitious habitat restoration that benefits, nature, climate resilience, and local communities. Over time, it will store carbon and provide natural flood management.

Early plant species surveys have identified great burnet, a key indicator of floodplain meadows, bird's-foot trefoil and field madder along with greater dodder, a rare parasitic plant. These discoveries have helped guide how we restore and protect each area. The lower lying areas that flood quickly will be planted with wet woodland like willow, poplar and alder. Former golf bunkers, ditches, and drains are being reshaped into scrapes and swales to hold water, support wetland wildlife, and slow the flow back to the river after heavy rain.

Existing trees, fairway woodland, and hedgerows are being retained where they are healthy and useful and there will be 35,000 new trees planted and 340 metres of new hedgerows established.

We have been made to feel very welcome in Harvington, from our initial consultation in the village hall in January, to the more recent community drop in held on site in July, to share our 50-year vision for the land. We look forward to keeping you updated on this project and the ways you can support us.

This project marks a significant step in turning a managed golf course into a thriving natural landscape that will benefit the local community and wildlife for generations to come.

150 years of the Mothers' Union

9 August was Mary Sumner Day when across the world, members of the Mothers' Union celebrate their founder, Mary Sumner.

This year was even more important as the Mother's Union is marking its 150th anniversary with local, national and global events, giving thanks for the vision that started in Mary's living room and has grown into a world-wide organisation with over four million members.

We are being asked to join with the Mothers' Union as they give thanks for the work of the organisation, reaching out to families in need through their work in prisons and hospitals, with the disadvantaged and the abused. The MU's social justice campaigns raise awareness of important issues such as domestic abuse and modern slavery.

There will be a special service marking 150 years of the Mothers' Union in Worcester Cathedral on Tuesday 24 November at 2 pm. All churches are invited to bring their Mothers' Union banners, even if there is no longer a branch meeting at their church. St Michael and All Angels

29th September

Michaelmas in English use has never confined it to the archangel alone. The Book of Common Prayer keeps the day as Saint Michael and All Angels, gathering the whole angelic host around the prince who guards Israel in Daniel and who leads the heavenly war against the dragon in Revelation, a scene the medieval painters loved and Epstein returned to at Coventry.

Because the feast came when the harvest was in, the working year turned on it. Michaelmas served as one of the four quarter days, so rents fell due, leases began and labourers took new places at the hiring fairs, and the tenant who brought his landlord a fattened goose knew what the bird was for. The universities and the law courts still open their year in Michaelmas term on the strength of that older reckoning.

Devotion shaped the approach to the day as well as its aftermath. Some kept a St Michael's Lent, the forty days from the Assumption on 15 August, which St Francis observed and which English piety took up as a fast preparing for the feast.

Country custom then closed the season by leaving the blackberries after this date to the devil; who by varying tradition landed in a bramble when cast down from heaven, spitting or urinating on them as a curse – as to which, we can leave that to your personal superstitions.



Elections taking place this month... for the Church's General Synod

Every five years the Church of England elects its General Synod, and this autumn brings the next turn. Synod is the Church's national assembly. It is unique amongst churches in that it still makes law within England, approves liturgy and sets the direction of national church spending. Its decisions reach into every parish, shaping how many priests we have, how they are trained and paid, and how our churches are governed.

Synod sits in three houses: Bishops, Clergy and Laity. Bishops are there by office. Clergy in each diocese elect their own representatives. Lay members (normal church goers) are elected by the lay members of deanery synods, our local church councils. As such, the deanery synod forms the electorate for the House of Laity. That fact matters more than most people realise. **If your church does not have a deanery rep appointed, you don't get a vote. Make sure you are represented.**

The coming Synod faces real questions. How should the Church Commissioners' endowment (currently £11.7bn) be distributed, and how much of it should reach frontline ministry? How large should a benefice grow before the care of souls is stretched too thin? What protection should parishes enjoy when reorganisation is proposed? Alongside ongoing debates on ministry and liturgy the next session will form the church for the decades ahead. Members elected this autumn will vote on all of this and more.

You can still have your voice heard in several ways. Ask your deanery synod representation how they might vote, and what is important for you. If you have strong views, write to those standing in our diocese with the questions that matter – although this can be a rather opaque election, and hard to find out all the information, visit the diocesan website cofe-worcester.org.uk for the latest.

Once the election is completed this magazine will be sure to update you on who the 6 Worcester Diocese members of General Synod are.

In the meantime, we pray for all those who serve our church at the national and diocesan institutions, and for all those putting themselves forward for election.

From 'St James the Least of All'

Happily, the Church of England still retains some singular parish clergy. Take the parish of St James the Least of All. Here the elderly Anglo-Catholic vicar, Eustace, continues his correspondence to Darren, his nephew, a low-church curate recently ordained...as imagined by the Revd Dr Gary Bowness.

My dear Nephew Darren

Thank you for sending me the photograph of you having your face painted at your parish's 'Fun Day' – although I can't help feeling that to label an event 'fun' is the most effective way of draining it of all amusement whatsoever. Why on earth can't parishes continue with the traditional title of 'Crowning of the Rose Queen and Fete', equally traditionally grimly enjoyed to the accompaniment of thunder and torrential rain.

However, the one thing that caused me the greatest concern in your photo was the fact that you were wearing sandals. Sandals are only to be worn by Franciscan monks (without socks) and holidaymakers on Blackpool promenade (regrettably, generally with socks). I know that you will argue that Jesus wore sandals. This was mainly because reliable pairs of brogues had yet to be invented, but also because He lived in a hot, dry country. We live in a cold, wet one.

The only appropriate colour for footwear for a parish priest is black, and the only appropriate material is leather – although I will concede that can create difficulties. Wet leather shoes and polished marble church floors are a potentially lethal combination.

I well remember as a curate when old Canon Griffith entered the Sanctuary, having just got drenched coming from the Rectory. His feet moved across the marble floor some miles per hour faster than the rest of his body. Had he landed face down, the congregation may have assumed he was reverently prostrating himself before the altar. But lying in a supine position, staring in a dazed state at the rafters, only conveyed inappropriate indolence, when he should be at work.

No doubt this is all of little interest to you. I suspect your present church will be fully carpeted – it seems to go with your sort of theology.

Exploring young adult journeys to faith

Young adults are coming to faith in a range of different ways, some very different from previous generations, according to a new report.

New research commissioned by the Church of England uncovers how growing spiritual curiosity among young adults has led to a range of unexpected routes by which they are discovering Christian faith and finding community in Church of England churches. Conducted by Theos think tank and published in August, the research explores how Generation Z is engaging with Christianity in new ways amongst a changing cultural context.

'Understanding Young Adult Journeys to Faith in the Church of England' draws on in-depth interviews with 30 young adults aged 18 to 30 who began attending Church of England churches for the first time within the five years following the Covid-19 pandemic.

The report identifies several recurring themes in their paths to interaction with faith and the Church of England. Social media often served as an initial point of contact, introducing young adults to Christian ideas through podcasts, testimonies, debates, influencers and online content. For many, this led to deeper exploration through reading the Bible, engaging with theology and asking wider questions about meaning, purpose and truth, often before attending church for the first time.

Personal relationships were consistently found to play a significant role, with encouragement, invitations or stories from teachers, chaplains, friends, partners, clergy and church members often helping young people move from curiosity to attending church.

Community and a sense of belonging also emerged as a common experience of church, with many participants citing this as one of the reasons they continued attending and became more involved. Young people interviewed as part of the research were drawn to a wide range of Anglican traditions, including cathedrals, Anglo-Catholic, traditional prayer-book, as well as contemporary informal settings.

Across traditions, they reported being engaged by the “authenticity” and “seriousness” of worship, and valuing “confidence, consistency and depth” in the churches they had chosen to attend.

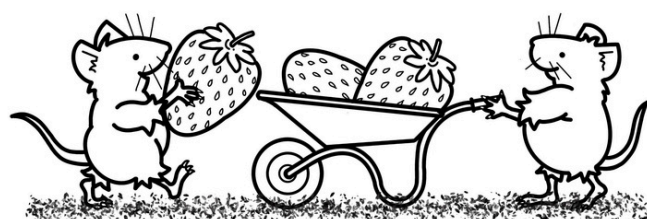
HARVEST FESTIVAL
